
It would be the best possible opening if you wrote a short message or preface as in the last issue, and with your permission we could accompany this with a photograph.

Seventy-three years after its inception, the Oxford University Conservative Association is flourishing. This term's activities have included an excellent selection of speaker meetings, a variety of social events, leafletting at Cowley, and early preparations for next term's Student Union elections. We have published this magazine as well as a fortnightly newsletter. OUCA is entering a new phase of active political campaigning. We are producing a paper on student loans for distribution to Members of Parliament and, in co-operation with local Conservatives, we are starting an advice centre for councilhouse tenants on their right to buy their own houses.

OUCA's aim in this university is to promote Conservatism both in University and local politics and on a more intellectual level. Speaker meetings is OUCA are far from being uncritical of party policy.
