## Dear Prime Minister

- I was sad to miss our meeting yesterday but of course I absolutely understand the pressures on time which confront you. Indeed I hate adding to them with our problems and only do so because I believe that British interests are being affected more by misunderstanding or mistake than anything else; and because your stalwart support of us and your understanding of our work leads me to believe that you would wish to know my views, for you have always been exceptionally kind and considerate to me.
- I attach our needs on a separate piece of paper. If these are not met, we will have suffered a 26% cut since 1980 in real terms. If no change is made in the present method of paying our way and this continues into next year, we will suffer a further cut which will bring the 26% cut up to 33%. No organisation can stand this sort of attrition. I am very confident of our financial controls and budgeting skills since the Seebohm/Chorley review and state this with absolute confidence.
- This year we are celebrating our Fiftieth Anniversary, as you know, with all sorts of high level festivities, including a visit here by Her Majesty The Queen, a concert at the Royal Festival Hall (paid for entirely by the private sector), a dinner given by you. I believe that after years of persistent work, the morale and the efficiency of the Council is on an entirely different basis, and these celebrations will greatly add to the confidence of all who work here. A setback now would undo all the reforms and enthusiasm we have managed to achieve and impart.

I am now in my last few months here before I retire. I see ahead great opportunities for Britain abroad through the British Council. I cannot believe that these opportunities should be abandoned for what are in national terms relatively small sums.

I am going to Wester Ross tonight but would return at once if you wanted to see me.

- the carrying forward of its 1983/84 £2.6m Spring Supplementary
- 2. the rent increase at its Spring Gardens premises (part year) £1.4m
